THE **DIRECTOR**



GEN HORIUCHIExecutive and Artistic Director

Gen Horiuchi, originally from Tokyo, Japan, moved to the United States after winning the Prix de Lausanne, the international ballet competition in Switzerland in 1980, and receiving a scholarship to study at the School of American Ballet. In 1982, the great George Balanchine invited him to join the New York City Ballet, where he became a principal dancer in 1989. He performed many ballets with the renowned company; Balanchine created the role of Mercury in the ballet *Perséphone* especially for him. Peter Martins, ballet master-in-chief, created ballets *Eight More* and *Les Gentilhommes* for Horiuchi as well.

Gen Horiuchi's Broadway musical credits include Andrew Lloyd Webber's *Song and Dance* and the role of Mr. Mistoffelees in *Cats*. He went on to perform that role in London's production of *Cats* and became the first performer to play the lead on both Broadway and in the West End in 1998. That same year, he choreographed the magnificent Opening Ceremony of the Winter Olympics in Nagano, Japan.

Horiuchi became Executive and Artistic Director of Saint Louis Ballet in 2000 and created more than 20 original works including seven full-length ballets for the company.

In 2010, he founded "Ballet for the Future" which tours Japan's major cities each summer with a company of professional ballet dancers. In 2016, the Japanese Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology awarded Horiuchi the prestigious Art Encouragement Prize in recognition of his work with "Ballet for the Future."

Synopsis

Act 1:

Alice is chasing butterflies on a warm summer day, reading over her sister's shoulder, when she catches sight of a White Rabbit in a waistcoat running by her. The White Rabbit looks at his wristwatch, exclaims that he is late, and pops down a rabbit hole. Alice follows the White Rabbit down the hole and comes upon a great hallway. She finds a bottle marked "DRINK ME" and downs the contents. Alice grows to a giant size and then shrinks before chasing the White Rabbit into a strange garden.

After barging in on a quartet of animals, Alice encounters the Tweedles, a pair of nonsensical twins who attempt to help her on her journey.

She comes across a grinning Cheshire Cat who explains that everyone in Wonderland is mad, including Alice herself.

Alice wanders off into the forest, where she meets a Caterpillar sitting on a mushroom. Alice watches as the Caterpillar transforms into a Butterfly. The Butterfly and Alice get into an argument, but before the Butterfly flies away, he tells Alice that different parts of the mushroom will make her grow or shrink. Alice once again spots the White Rabbit and follows him to see where he is going.

Act 2:

Alice travels to the March Hare's house to find the March Hare, the Mad Hatter, and the Dormouse having tea together. Treated rudely by all three, Alice stands by the tea party, uninvited. She learns that they have wronged Time and are trapped in perpetual tea-time. After a final discourtesy, Alice leaves and journeys through the forest.

She meets the King and Queen of Hearts.

After catching the Jack of Clubs eating one of the Queen's tarts, The Queen orders, "Off with his head!"

Alice tries to protect the Jack, and the White Rabbit suggests a trial.

After the Tweedles, Cheshire Cat, Mad Hatter, March Hare, and Dormouse testify at the trial, the Queen orders, "Off with their heads!" and a chase ensues.

Alice awakes back in the garden with her sister and tries to tell her the tale of her wild adventure.

THE **CHOREOGRAPHER**

BRIAN ENOS, Alice in Wonderland Mr. Enos, originally from San Francisco began studying ballet at the age of 16. After his training at the Maria Vegh Ballet Centre and The Houston Ballet Academy, he was invited to join Houston Ballet at 18. After several vears performing with Houston Ballet, Mr. Enos went on to dance for Hubbard Street Dance Chicago for eight years before retiring from the stage in 2010. He has danced leading roles in works by choreographers such as Jiri Kylian, William Forsythe, Ohad Naharin, Ben Stevenson, Twyla Tharp, and Christopher Bruce.



Mr. Enos also has a choreographic career spanning 18 years, with over 30 original works and glowing reviews from both critics and audiences throughout the United States and abroad. Some of the companies for which he's created work include Houston Ballet, Hubbard Street Dance Chicago, Ballet Met, Nashville Ballet, Grand Rapids Ballet, DanceWorks Chicago, and many more.

THE **VISUAL ARTIST**

Luis Grané, Alice in Wonderland

Born in Argentina, Luis Grané studied medicine and worked in a human anatomy laboratory at Buenos Aires University before studying fine arts and graphic design. Following his true passion, Grané moved first to London where he worked in advertising for almost four years, and then to Mexico, where he worked in visual arts and advertising and became strongly influenced by Mesoamerican Art.

Grané then moved to Toronto, where he won the Dick Friesen/Zlatko Grigic Award for Excellence in Animation at Sheridan College in 1996, and was recruited by DreamWorks Animation SKG. This meant relocating to Los Angeles, where he worked as an animator, visual effects artist, and character designer for DreamWorks, Pixar, Disney, Laika, Sony Pictures, Aardman, and Warner Brothers.



His credits include films as diverse as The Prince

of Egypt, Spirit, Spiderman 2 (Academy Award Winner for Best Visual Effects), The Matrix, The Aviator, Ratatouille (Academy Award Winner for Best Animated Feature), Hotel Transylvania, Diary of a Wimpy Kid, and The Boxtrolls. He has also collaborated with numerous renowned directors such as Sam Raimi and Richard Linklater.

While pursuing his career in Hollywood, Grané attended Peter Liashkov's painting workshops for two years and studied painting with Bonita Helmer at Otis College of Art. Grané's original work as an independent artist has been featured in group exhibits at the Pozzi Gallery in Buenos Aires, the Cartoon Museum in London, and the Enisen Gallery in Los Angeles, and worldwide as part of the Sketchtravel Book art project.

His work was also selected as the cover of the Totoro Forest Project book, an artistic venture that gathered prominent artists from around the world to save a forest in Japan. Grané currently works in his studio in the Arts District in Downtown Los Angeles and recently published his first solo book, "Sad Stories."



SAINT LOUIS BALLET TEAM



CICI HOUSTON SUDHOLT, Rehearsal Director

CiCi Houston Sudholt rejoined Saint Louis Ballet in 2015, when she was given the position of Rehearsal Director and Director of Education and Outreach. Originally from Detroit, she received her training from Theresa Crawford, Central Pennsylvania Youth Ballet, and the Virginia School of the Arts under the direction Petrus Bosman and David Keener. A former company dancer with SLB, Houston Sudholt performed featured roles in ballets by numerous choreographers including George Balanchine.

Gen Horiuchi, and Francis Patrelle, and performed as a guest artist internationally. A teacher since 1998, Houston Sudholt was at Alexandra Ballet for 12 years, where she taught, choreographed, served on the Board and as Administrator, eventually earning the title of Co-Artistic Director. Also a former Director for Regional Dance America, she participated in 11 festivals in the MidStates region and nationally. As Rehearsal Director for SLB, Houston Sudholt rehearses repertoire and works closely with guest choreographers and répétiteurs.



TANYA STRAUTMANN, Manager of Design and Marketing As a former principal dancer of Saint Louis Ballet, Strautmann is dedicated to the guidance of SLB dancers, the ballet repertoire and the company's image in the community as expressed in graphics and online media. She graduated from Lindenwood University with a bachelor's degree in fine arts emphasizing web design and administration while continuing to dance professionally with Saint Louis Ballet. She performed lead roles in *Giselle, Romeo and Juliet, Swan Lake, The Nutcracker*,

George Balanchine's *Serenade* and *Allegro Brillante*. She guest performed for Toledo Ballet and in Osaka, Japan for Gen Horiuchi's "Ballet for the Future". She retired from performing in 2014. In addition to her company duties, she serves as the co-director for Saint Louis Ballet School.



JULIE ABERNATHIE, Director of Finance

Julie Abernathie has over 20 years of experience in accounting and finance. She has been the director of finance for Saint Louis Ballet Company and School since 2008. She has a bachelor's degree in accounting with a minor in French from Southeast Missouri State University, successfully completed the CPA exam, and recently obtained her master's degree in accounting from Indiana Wesleyan University. She held the position of assistant controller at Wave Technologies, a training

company. She has loved the arts since youth, when she studied dance, clarinet and piano in the St. Louis area.

Maureen has designed lighting for theatre, dance, opera, concert, and television, and currently designs for many companies around the Saint Louis area.

Jim Dolan received his bachelor's degree in theater production and design from St. Louis University in 2006. He has worked in many capacities backstage and beyond, including building scenery for the St. Louis Shakespeare Festival, lighting ballroom dance competitions across the country with Frogmouth Productions, and designing lights for St. Louis Shakespeare Company. He is currently the house electrician for the Touhill Performing Arts Center and has worked with Saint Louis Ballet as a technical director since 2007.

A self-taught seamstress, she has perfected the construction of a tutu and continues to challenge herself with new projects.
